


IS THIS CHANGE JUSTIFIED?

Dear Editor,

The results of this season's international figure skating championships will be calculated on a revised basis, effective from December 1. But rejoicing may be curbed if and when the full nature and implications of the alteration are widely understood

Briefly, the change amounts to this: Instead of the outcome being determined by the overall placings of the judges in the competition as a whole, their placings in each of the competition's three sections

will be factorised thus:

The position a skater is placed in the figures will be multiplied by 0.6. His position in the short free skating will be multiplied by 0.4. His position in the long free skating will not be factorised.

By this means a skater coming fourth in the figures (4×0.6) , second in the short free (2×0.4) and second in the long free (2×1) would end with a total placement of 5.2. The lowest placement of any skater thus calculated would be the winner.

To make this change, the International Skating Union (ISU) is suggesting that the system is more correct and fair than the

one previously used.

If it had been used during the past four years, Robin Cousins would have been World Champion twice, in 1978 (instead of Charlie Tickner) and 1979 (instead of Vladimir Kovalev), but he would not have won the Olympic gold medal in 1980.

By the same token, Linda Fratianne would have been the Ladies World Champion for the past four years and Anett Potzsch would have been denied the title she gained in 1978 and 1980.

Thus it could be argued that the ISU is really implying that the wrong people

sometimes won in recent seasons.

For this reason if for no other, one wonders whether there is enough justification for altering the system in the way that it has been.

ICE ABROAD

THE RICHMOND TROPHY

The 32nd annual contest for the Richmond International Trophy took place at Richmond ice rink, England, on November 2 and 3. Eleven skaters from eight countries made up the entrythe smallest since 1952. Unfortunately the Skate Canada events had again been fixed for the immediately preceding week, drawing away possible entries from the senior international competition (the Richmond Trophy was founded in 1949, and past winners have included notable skaters as Jeannette Altwegg, Sjoukje Dijkstra. Christine Errath, Dorothy Hamill, and Lynn Nightingale).

Reiko Kobayashi of Japan, winner of the compulsory figures last year, started well with a good RFO Counter, but was by the sixteen-year-old beaten Daniela Massaneck from Oberstdorf. The tall Californian Lynn Smith was third, with what looked like a well-traced figure but skated with a drooping head position. These three kept clear ahead of the others throughout the figures, and on the second on (LFO Paragraph Bracket) Miss Smith overtook the Japanese; at the end of the figures Miss Massaneck was a unanimous winner (her steady speed and erect stance made her very smooth to watch), Miss Smith second Kobayashi third. The two British compe-Karen Wood and Beverley Dempsey, were forth and fifth.

The short and long free programs completely altered the situation. In the short, Miss Massaneck landed her double axel on two feet and collapsed on the jump-sitspin; this gave her a disastrous tenth place. Lynn Smith, who in practice had been trying hard to do a triple lutz/double loop combination without success, sensibly decided to do a double instead; her fast-flowing skating showed

some of the form which in 1979 won her the St. Gervais and Nebelhorn competitions, and she was first in this part of the event. Second was Janina Wirth (East Germany), aged thirteen, who did a difficult combination of triple toe-loop and double loop; she looked the most promising of all this year's Richmond Trophy contestants, with a neat and graceful style. Karen Wood, with the same combination as Miss Smith, gave a fine display to take third place, just ahead of the other East German Carola Paul, whose combination included a triple salchow.

On combined results of figures and short programs, Lynn Smith now led with seven first places; Daniela Massaneck was second and Karen Wood third. They were not far apart on points, however (the new ISU results system was not used, so individual judges' points leads were important), and clearly anything could happen in the long free-skating programs.

It did. Miss Massaneck fell on her double axel and triple toe-salchow, and landed another triple on two feet; her hopes of being on the rostrum, let alone winning, melted away. Karen Wood opened with a confident triple salchow and triple toe-loop; she had to put a hand out to steady her triple loop, but otherwise gave an attractive performance, skated at the end to the delightful "Banditenstreiche" overture of Franz von Suppe.

The two East Germans were best in the long free. Carola Paul tried more triple jumps than anyone, but with variable success; she fell on her first toe salchow, succeeded on the second, failed the loop, landed the toe-loop and salchow properly. She also had an odd mishap before a double axel: she seemed to forget to take off, and instead fell flat

on her face. Her program was rather hectic, rushing from jump to jump; her younger compatriot, Janina Wirth, gave a better-balanced and more artistic performance, even though there were only three triples and the salchow resulted in a fall.

Skating last but one, Lynn Smith seemed to have victory in her grasp. It was not to be. She achieved great height on her jumps, but there were no triples; some of them were not even doubles. She was clearly much below her usual standard, and in the final results she dropped to fourth. Victory went to Miss Wood. the most consistent of the competitors and the first British winner of this famous Trophy since Yvonne Sugden in 1955.

BEREAVEMENTS...

Dr. Laszlo Szollas, the most successful figure skating competitor in Hungary, died on October 4, 1980, at the age of 73. He and his partner, Emilia Rotter, were World Champion Pair Skaters four times—in 1931, 1933, 1934, and 1935. They won the European Championship in 1934. They were Olympic Bronze Medalists twice—in 1932 at Lake Placid and in 1936 at Garmischpartenkirchen. The death of Dr. Szollas is a great loss to his sportsloving friends and countrymen.

In Memorium Hayward Kendall Kelley 1897 — 1980



Hayward Kendall Kelley, the eleventh President of the USFSA, 1952–55, died on October 29th in Cleveland, Ohio, at age eighty-three. He and Henry Beatty, with whom he grew up, were towering personalities in the figure skating world. One remembers Ken as a World Judge and Referee and USFSA official. We profoundly regret the loss of his never failing sense of humor and always available helping hand with any problem.

Ken led me, and many other interested people, by the hand, through the intricacies of judging, refereeing and accounting, competitions and tests; patiently explaining the reasons why and why not. He was a superb teacher as well as a talented participant and, for all of us, a kindly father image, regardless of our respective ages.

Ken's years as chairman of many committees and as president were pretelevision, when the USFSA was a small, somewhat esoteric organization of a few highly principled and dedicated individ-

uals. He had a rich store of anecdotes from decades of figure skating experience.

Illustrative of the relative lack of complexity then and now, he related how he and Henry Beatty decided to become judges. They went to the Canadian National Championships and so astounded the Canadian officials by requesting to trial judge, that they were permitted to do so! Forthwith, Joseph Savage, then President of the USFSA, appointed them! His stories of outdoor World Championships in Europe include one of David Jenkins being blown to a stop during figures by a forty mile an hour gale in sub zero temperatures in Helsinki, Finland, when judges and skaters alike had to warm up between figures at an inside fire.

Ken remained active as a USFSA official, judge and referee, through the rapidly growing years from the 30's through the 70's, helping to shape the policies and procedures of the USFSA, acting as a wise and friendly mentor to a host of those who followed him in the work of the USFSA. He was always as ready and willing to officiate in a local club competition or test session as he was to officiate in a National or World Championship.

Ken's achievements are impressive: President, Treasurer, and Honorary Member; Chairman of Amateur Status, Dance, International, Judges, Skating and Judging Standards Committees; Member ISU Dancing Technical Committee; Referee of three regional, two Sectional, four National, two North American and three World Championships; Judge in one Regional, eleven Sectional, thirteen National, one North American, Olympic and World Championship. Few, if any, testimonials of dedication to figure skating and the USFSA, stand to the credit of anyone.

He will be remembered and admired by all of those who knew him and who try to perpetuate the basic principles he taught and so well typified.

Men's Singles in the 80's

young skater, just starting out in competitive skating, recently wrote to *Skating*: "Thanks for running 'Champions of the 80's'; I know now I'm going to do well in competition." She went on to say the information had been valuable to her as an evaluation of her own goals.

The intention of the articles was to give our readers an overview of many of the skaters facing the 80's. "Champions of the 80's" may have been too strong a title—"Profiles of the 80's" may have been more appropriate. We couldn't, unfortunately, list every skater, and in some instances skaters listed have dropped out of competition entirely. It is unfortunate that in some instances the purpose of the articles was misconstrued, and on reflection this can be understood.

In the December issue of *Skating*, four Ladies singles skaters were profiled. Again, the purpose of the articles was to give our readers an opportunity to gain insights into a cross-section of styles, philosophies, attitudes and personalities, characteristics that they, our readers, may possibly identify with themselves in their own pursuits of ice skating.

In this issue are profiled four men's singles skaters, and as with the Ladies singles skaters profiled in December, each have differing characteristics and are at various stages in their skating career. There's Scott Hamilton, with a determined attitude toward skating that helped him defeat almost overwhelming physical odds and see him place fifth at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games and fifth at World's. David Santee, who narrowly missed medals at both the Olympic Winter Games and World's, and has adopted the attitude of "Rocky" as his goal for the future. Allen Schramm, plagued by illness or injury at crucial points in his competitive career, with a unique style of his own, and Mark Cockerell, who typifies the many young, talented skaters in the United States seeking their own personal goals. Mark recently placed second at the Ennia Challenge Cup in The Hague, Netherlands.

The Determination that is Scott Hamilton



ollowing Scott Hamilton's exhilarating performance at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games at Lake Placid, NY, Robin Cousins, Gold Medal winner, suggested that "Scotty may well be my successor in 1984."

Scotty placed fifth at Lake Placid, a position that prompted: "I never expected to place where I have this year."


In fact, it's surprising that Scotty made it at all! Scotty began skating when he was nine-years-old purely as treatment for a debilitating illness that could possibly take his life before he saw another birthday. Skating injected young Scotty with energy, and improved his mental and physical condition dramatically.

Scotty joined the Junior Skating Club in his home town of Bowling Green, Ohio, and began skating five days a week. He considered skating more than therapy when he took a Gold Medal at the 1969 Tri-State Free Skating Competition.

In 1973, Scotty collected the Midwestern Sectional Novice Championship, and in 1976 the Junior Men's at Eastern Great Lakes, prompting a sports writer to comment, "The Junior Men's division was led by Scott Hamilton, who proved once again his ability to jump effortlessly and complete his landings with smoothness and precision in his nearly flawless long program."

Scotty's year was 1976. Following his triumph at Eastern Great Lakes, he went on to Nationals in Colorado Springs and took top honors in the Junior Men's competition. Ranked fourth in a close race for the figure lead, Scotty claimed the title with consistently strong free skating. His winning long free, in particular, demonstrated a flow and an ease in jumping, matched by no other competitor. He was the first National Junior Men's Champion to be selected under the then new rules using a compulsory short program, wherein consistently strong figure and free skating proved most successful.

Coaching played an enormous part in developing Scotty's confidence, he claims; and credits Mary and Evy Scotvold for his style. "When I was with Mary, she got me together," he says, "Mary gave me better spins and presentation, while Evy helped me learn to skate more consistently." Needing more work on his figures, Scotty traveled to Denver to work with Carlo Fassi.



in Cincinnati, losing his World Team berth. Although he skated well, opening with a triple Lutz triple toe loop, and a high double Axel, he was too far behind Charlie Tickner, David Santee, and Scott Cramer to catch up.

A vital factor in Scotty's subsequent resurgence was his move to Philadelphia in 1979 to study under Don Laws at the Philadelphia Skating Club & Humane Society. Working with Don, everything gel-

led.

"I got a solid combination in the short program and my figures improved 100 percent," says Scotty. "My long program improved also and included some combinations that showed me off better than in the past."

In September, 1979, Scotty competed in the Norton Skate competition at Lake This was the first championship international competition to be held in the United States, and was planned as a "dummyrun" for the upcoming Olympic Winter Games.

Scotty was in fourth place after the figures and short program, but soon overtook Jan Hoffman of East Germany, and his fellow teammates, Scott Cramer and

> David Santee. In his report, on the the Norton Skate for Skating, Howard Bass wrote, "The diminutive Hamilton seized his chance and hardly put a foot wrong, clinching a memorable victory with a brillant performance that included eight great triples-two salchows, three toe loops, two

walleys and a Lutz." (Skating, Oct. 1979, p. 35.)

Maintaining the form which won him the Gold medal at Norton Skate, Scotty stormed through the Eastern Sectional competition in December 1979 to capture the Gold. He repeated his winning program at the Nationals in Atlanta in mid-January, 1980, winning the Bronze medal.

Scotty's subsequent performance at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games, and at Scotty faced another disappointment World's, proved Scotty to be a firm and

Of his first year in Seniors competition, Scotty remarked, "I placed well in figures, but dropped way down in freestyle. Then in 1978 I got my consistency back and also got the triple Lutz, so that put me right up into third place." In fact, Scotty was the first American to land the triple Lutz in the short program.

in 1979, placing fourth at the Nationals competent skater.





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

resident Coolidge's words aptly describe the guts and determination of a young man from Greenbrae, California who has worked his way close to the brink of success three times only to be knocked back to square one each time by fate. I refer to the innovative Allen Schramm. To quote from the USOC Olympic book, "Schramm has a style and personality in his skating that are unmatched anywhere in the world today."

To try and describe an Allen Schramm skating performance is a difficult task. He has been called: the most dramatic skater in the world; the most creative skater in the country; one of the few totally complete skaters; one of those rare artists who add new elements and expand the sport—and yet these quotes do not encompass it all. Watching an Allen Schramm routine you feel yourself pulled into the music, the movements, the expression and the creativity which exudes from his entire body. He gives a total skating performance.

Allen first gained recognition in 1976 when he captured the 1976 Pacific Coast Junior Men's Championship and went on to second in freestyle and fourth overall in the U.S. National Junior Men's Championship. From this placement, he was appointed alternate to represent the USA on its first Junior World Team.

Favored to win going into the 1977 National Junior Men's competition, tragedy struck its first blow when Allen was hospitalized with pneumonia one week prior to the event.

For the upstart skater, 1978 looked like it was going to be a banner year. In his first year at the senior men's level, Allen captured the Gold medal at North Atlantics, the Silver medal at Easterns, and the Silver medal at the National Sports Festival. But the U.S. Senior Men's Nationals would be denied him. This time he was forced to withdraw after figures due to a bout with Pleuritis which made it too painful to continue.

On his first international appointment representing the USA, he wowed the Europeans by capturing triple Gold medals in figures, freestyle and overall points at St. Gervais, France and Oberstdorf, Germany. The Dutch Figure Skating Association, impressed by Allen's performance, invited him to compete in the prestigious Hague competition. Unfortunately, due to previous committments Allen was unable to accept the offer.

Continuing this winning streak, in 1979 Allen went on to win both the North Atlantic and Eastern Senior Men's Championships. At the U.S. Nationals, his first exposure to a national television audience, the record books placed him sixth in figures, seventh overall, but he gained recognition as a future Champion with whom to be reckoned. In describing his five minute freestyle performance, Dick Button, of ABC's Wide World of Sports, described him as "one of the few truly creative skaters in a long time, who has it all together, contributing new elements to the sport of skating, one of the few people who is a totally all-around skater." Skating magazine said, "he dared to be different-doing some of the trickiest, most impossible footwork ever seen." Needless to say, Allen received the longest standing ovation of the event.

In his third International Competition, Allen placed second in short and first in long, winning the Silver medal in Prague Skate, Czechoslovakia in 1979.


Prepared to defend his title in the 1980 Senior Men's Eastern Championships, the hand of fate struck once again. Allen was hospitalized with an emergency appendectomy a few days prior to the event. Knowing that he could not skate up to his full capabilities, he pulled himself together after the surgery and went on to skate Nationals, at times using sheer guts alone to finish the long program. He was rewarded for his determination and perserverance with a standing ovation and invitations to skate the U.S. National Champion Exhibitions in Nassau. New York and honored to be the only skater invited to perform at the 1980 Lake Placid Olympic Games Ecumenical Celebration. He was also among the few skaters selected to perform the entire Tour of Champions, a nationwide showcase of championship talent.

Allen Schramm's style and innovations have been copied the world over, but never duplicated. He brings to skating his love for music, of which he is an accomplished pianist and guitarist, and transforms all the single elements of skating into a unique, total creative athletic program.

Adversity is the matter from which character is created and champions made. Perserverance and determination are the qualities with which Allen has learned to combat these adverse forces. With the Gods of fate smiling with good fortune on this persistent skater, 1981 may well prove to be the year of Allen Schramm.

Debbie: Are there any skating manu-

vers that you feel Jimmy Santee does better than you

do?

David: First of all, we are built differ-

ently. I am very "closed-hipped" and Jimmy is very "opened-hipped." He can do spread eagles and the cantilever, and I can not. Basically, anything that has to do with an open-hipped position, he can do better. It's easier for me on figures to keep my hips closed, and to have more

control on my jumps.

Debbie: What do you do to unwind

and relax?

David: Since I'm a big sports fan, I'm usually involved in another

sport when I'm not skating. I like tennis, golf, touch football, baseball and basketball. And I listen to music a lot.

Debbie: Do you listen to the radio or

do you have certain records that mean something to you?

David: It's not like I put on "Rocky" when I'm away from the rink

just to be psyched up. Also, my brother and I go to a lot of movies just to get away from skating. When we travel to competitions, I like to unwind by walking around and seeing the city. Seeing the

sights takes your mind off the

ekating

Debbie: What do you regard as your favorite place in all of your

skating trips?

David: Oh, there have been so many places I've enjoyed. Both

times that I competed in Japan, we stopped off in Hawaii on the way back, and that was great. But I couldn't really say what was my favorite city for a competition. In some respects, how you do in a competition affects how you look upon a city. I enjoyed the village atmosphere of

Lake Placid. As far as Europe

goes, my favorite spot would be London or anywhere in France or Germany.

Debbie: How often do you get new

boots?

triples.

David:

I don't change patch boots very often. I've had my current pair for two years and the previous ones for four years. I go through two to three pairs of freestyle boots a year. I like the feeling of a new boot after about three days of skating in it. Usually after about four months, I like to get a new pair. Around competition time, I don't wait as long as I would in the spring or summer because I like the added support for my

Debbie: Whose idea was the Loop Brothers comedy routine that you do with your brother?

David: It was basically my idea, although we had done a routine to "Me and My Shadow" for lots of shows in the past. We wanted to do something that related to the audience more and that we could relate to more and have fun with. So when we saw the "Blues Brothers" movie, I thought it would be a great idea to do something like that. After we decided on the idea and I cut the music, then it became Jimmy's ball game. He really enjoyed making up the number.

Debbie: So it was essentially done without any professional help.

David: None whatsoever. It has all

None whatsoever. It has all been done by us—right down to the outfits. In fact, we even went to the Salvation Army store to look for parts of the outfits, because we figured the worse it looked, the better it was. It's the only number I've ever done where

I can just crumple up my out-

fit and throw it into a bag.

Debbie:

What do you feel is the best

part of competition?

David:

I feel the best part is the competition itself. You're putting your talent out in front of people to see who's the best and seeing if you can do your best with your ability. I don't really dislike any of the three phases. There are great parts in all three and different pressures. With compulsory figures you have to be very exact and precise, and that's hard when you get in front of judges and get a little nervous. In the short program, obviously the pressure is on because you have to do all seven moves. You have to have enough revolutions in the spins, and the jumps and footwork have to be done cleanly. That puts an added pressure, but I seem to enjoy that. Last year I had my best year ever in the short program. I can't really explain why. I just seemed to enjoy doing it every time.

Debbie:

What brought you to that

point of enjoying it?

David:

I think it was because I had more confidence in myself. I knew that I could go out and do the program and be com-

petitive.

Debbie:

You always seem to get charged up like a horse at the Kentucky Derby who can't wait to get out of the gate.

David:

I pride myself on the fact that every time I have stepped out onto the ice in an exhibition or competition, I have been able to get myself up and put 100% into it every time. I can remember one time in my whole career when I didn't give 100%. That was in a show in Pittsburgh where I didn't feel good. After the first number, I felt so guilty that I really

went out and skated my butt off in the second half. But basically, I'm really proud of myself for at least going after everything. There were a couple of years that I was very scared and I didn't mentally go after everything. But still, it's not as if I didn't care. I've always cared every time no matter how big or little it was.

Debbie:

David, could you recall the best figure you've ever skated

in competition?

David:

The back paragraph bracket in this past Olympics was possibly the best I've ever done. although I took second on it. It seemed that everything clicked at that time. After the first two tracings were right on each other. I felt very strong. I felt so strong and sure throughout the whole figure that I nailed it. It was a one-liner. It really turned things around because in the past, if I had done a bad first figure, I would have fallen apart. But this time when the first figure didn't go well, I just turned right around and nailed the second figure and got back into the ball game.

Debbie:

Did you ever think, "What if I blow it?", during those six tracings or did you blank out and enjoy it or just keep up a positive monolog?

David:

I just kept concentrating and saying, "Remember this position, remember that position." Because the tendency is after two or three tracings to say, "Don't blow it." That's when you really have to bear down and really do the positions or it can fall apart.

Debbie:

How did you feel the next time you had to do that figure

at Worlds?

David: At Worlds, I didn't do any-

thing outstanding but I didn't make any major mistakes. Avoiding major errors is the key to any competition. But I wasn't really affected by my performance on that figure in the Olympics because each time is a different time.

Debbie: Under what circumstances do you feel that a skater should

change coaches?

David: I think you have

I think you have to feel like you're getting something out of your training with your coach. Your coach should motivate you to train properly and your coach has to know what's good for you. The main thing for me is that I have to know that my coach cares.

Debbie: What will it take for you to win the Nationals this year?

David: In order for me to win the Nationals (and Worlds) this year. I just have to go out and do what I'm capable of doing. I've been competing for a long time and I've built up a good reputation. I feel that right now I am the favorite to be the National and World Champion, I just have to understand for myself that I have to try to get into the best shape I possibly can and go out and do my thing and not worry about my other competitors. I feel that if I skate my very best, then I'll

have a good chance. **Debbie:** What was the first question that your sports psychologist, Dr. Ogilve, asked you?

He wanted to know why I did didn't believe in my ability. We had met at the Squaw Valley training camp in the spring of '79 and he came to watch the Norton Skate competition at Lake Placid in September of '79. He said that he wanted to slap me in the face in the long program

because I was so psyched out that I was just in another world. I had really folded in the tent, psychologically. He said it was a waste of my talent because I didn't believe in what I was doing. It all started when I was favored to win the '77 Nationals and Charlie (Tickner) defeated me there. The doubts that I developed then magnified as time passed. How long did it take for you to recycle physically and emotionally after the Olympics

to recycle physically and emotionally after the Olympics and Worlds.?

David: The Olympics was such an exciting time for me. I had accomplished so many things, so having to get right back up for Worlds was a difficult task. Arriving in Dortmund was de-

Debbie:

so having to get right back up for Worlds was a difficult task. Arriving in Dortmund was depressing. Nobody really wanted to be there. After that I was physically and mentally exhausted. I had done seven competitions last year. It took time to ease up and get my thoughts back. The Olympic Tour helped, although it was tiring. But when the summer came around, I was ready to go. I've learned better how to pace myself physically. The key time for an international competitor is the fall and winter.

Debbie: Since the ISU dropped one of the two Senior figure groups in June, how has your prac-

David: tice been affected?
I don't like it. With only six figures, it's really boring. I've worked on the same figures for ten years. I don't need that much time to get my figures into competition form.
There are always things to learn, but it's not like there a are any major problems. The hardest thing is to get myself emotionally ready on each patch, unless it's about six

weeks or less to a competi-

David:

tion. It's more difficult to practice because it's hard for the coaches to teach the same thing every day.

Debbie: What do you think is the prognosis for figures in interna-

tional competition?

David: I don't know. There seems to be an ebb and flow. One group in the ISU wants to get rid of figures and another group wants them to stay in.

Debbie: What do you feel will most likely be your occupation once you retire from amateur skating competition?

I would like to get into broadcasting, but I'm leaving that option very open at this point. I'm just concentrating on this competitive year. I'll worry about that when I decide that my competitive

career is over.

Debbie: What has been the most thrilling moment for you as a skat-

er?

David:

David:

Without a doubt, finishing my program in the '80 Olympics. The background to that involves the fact that for the last three or four years I was having a battle with my confidence. I didn't have the confidence I needed to be a top competitor and be in the top three or four in the world. It was unfortunate because I always had the talent, but I just never believed it. The year before I had placed thirteenth the short program at Worlds. But I had been working with Dr. Ogilve and making great progress. I felt that the big test would be in the short program in Olympics. There I was in third after figures. I had a chance to hold third or at least be in the fight-that's all I wanted to do. I had to prove something to myself. I had to prove that

under extreme pressure, I could go out and do my best job. And the morning of the short program event, I had received a picture from Sylvester Stallone, wishing me good luck. It was perfect timing. There I was trying to go after a dream I had for a long timeto not just be another nobody. When the program was over, it was such a great relief to know that I had beaten my problem. That was the meaning behind the display of emotion that I showed after the program. That was the greatest moment in my career. Now I feel a lot more confident on the ice.

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Mark Cockerell

n 1976, Mark Cockerell of Southern California won the first ever Junior World Men's Championship in Megeve, France. Four years later, at age eighteen, he is ranked eighth in Senior Nationals and is working hard to pull up to a medal-winning position in San Diego.

An eleven-year veteran who began skating because his parents enjoyed doing so, Mark collected the 1975 National Novice and 1976 National Junior Men's Silver Medals en route to his Junior World title. Two years later in his first international senior competitions, he placed second at St. Gervais and Obertsdorf, then became Southwest Pacific and Pacific Coast Champion and placed eighth at Nationals. He missed out on a Nationals bid in 1979, but this year bounced back to again achieve eighth position. This November he represented the U.S. in the Ennia Challenge Cup at the Hague and was the alternate for Yugoslavia's Golden Spin. (As of this writing Ennia has not taken place; therefore, no results can be included.)

Small-5'6", 134 pounds—and powerful, Mark says without hesitation that his greatest strength is his triple jumping ability. "I've got seven triples in my program now, and they've all been really consistent—all the same speed and height." As for his weaknesses, "I don't have any, he quips. "Actually, I've worked a lot on style, impression and figures. My figures have really improved. I'm not embarrassed by them any more. I used to be," he notes with a laugh.

A member of the Arctic Blades FSC, Mark spends thirty-one hours over six days a week on the ice, primarily at Pickwick Arena in his native Burbank, California. He credits much of his improvement to his coach of two years Betty Berens, mother of skaters, Susan Berens and Sally Berens Porter, whose grandfather Norville Baptie is known as the "Grandfather of Skating."

"I'm doing a thousand times better since I started with Betty," he says. "I've been much more relaxed when I skate because we laugh a lot and joke around, and it takes a lot of the tension off."

Berens, an affable woman with a twinkle in her eye, agrees. "We have a good time together. We work hard together but we enjoy it." Besides improving Mark's figures, she put him on a stamina-building program, adding an extra minute in practice to his five-minute program.

"I just pick up part of my program again and repeat it," Mark explains. "It's given me a second wind. Now I can get through my program easily without looking completely beaten and dragged out."

Berens used to have Mark stroke for five minutes at the end of his training sessions. "It killed him to do it and sometimes it killed me to watch him, but he had to learn to get through his program."

She keeps a watchful eye to ensure that Mark does not skate too much. "We've found that if he overskates, then he suffers, so we've tried to work out patterns where he does well. If he shows off, then he starts to slip."

"I have to kind of keep myself under control," her pupil confesses. "I have a lot of energy and the only way to burn it off is by going nuts."

As part of his training program, Mark also takes on-ice ballet class from Ricky Harris—"off-ice ballet doesn't relate to skating as much"—diets, and lifts weights. Barring injuries or skate problems, he trains fifty weeks a year and on his vacations and days off likes archery, "any sport you can do outdoors," and building miniature electronically-controlled boats and planes.

Reviewing his career up to now, Mark says that winning Junior Worlds is the highlight so far. "That was the greatest

thing that ever happened to me. It was the biggest thrill I ever had, hearing the National Anthem for the first time. Other than that, last year was the best year for me. I've been skating better and better all year long." In 1979, he won the Special Achievement Award (formerly the Helms Award) at the Arctic Blades Invitational, voted, according to Berens, by the competition judges and others 'to the competitor they would most want to see again.' That was very exciting."

As for the coming year, Mark plans to work mostly on style, presentation and figures. "The triples are always there—I don't have to worry about them. I'm just going to try to sharpen the landings a little bit, try to make the jumps look easier than they are." He feels his major competitors will be Robert Wagenhoffer, Brian Boitano, David Santee and Scott Hamilton.


Looking ahead, how does he think that skating will differ in the '80's from

the '70's? "There's the new system of judging, with mostly ordinals now. The judges are really going to be picking a lot on the short program—it's going to be one of the major parts of the competition. I think there will be more emphasis on freestyle and less on figures—it seems every year the emphasis on figures gets less and less."

When he finishes competing, Mark plans to join an ice show, and after several years of that—"maybe twenty or thirty, I might be another Richard Dwyer"—possibly teach.

He's optimistic about the future. "I can tell when it's going to be a good year. It depends on how hard you work, and I've been working hard. I'm looking forward to this year and the years ahead. They're really the big years."




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SKATE CANADA 1980 -Howard Bass

For the first time since being launched in 1973, all three Skate Canada events were won by competitors from the same nation—a proud distinction achieved by United States skaters against some very skilled opposition.

Fifty-four skaters from thirteen countries took part in this seventh international meeting of a series now firmly established as the world's major annual non-championship competitions.







The venue this time was the Stampede Corral ice stadium in Calgary, where Skate Canada had begun seven years previously, having since been promoted at Kitchener, Edmonton, Ottawa, Moncton and Vancouver—a yearly ritual interrupted only in 1979, when the pre-Olympic Norton Skate was staged instead at Lake Placid.

The men's contest was the most talented, producing an exciting finale between the three who might well go on to share the world championship medals in March at Hartford.

Scotty Hamilton, who led after every stage, hardly put a foot wrong on the way to a memorable victory. Each of his figures was studiously and smoothly etched. The likeable lad from Bowling Green, Ohio, with light frame, boyish face and diminutive stature (five feet three) often lending a much younger appearance than his twenty-two years—went on magnificently to avenge his defeat by the Canadian, Brian Pockar, only a month previously in the St. Ivel contest.

Hamilton's short and long free performances contained near-faultless multiple jumps, highlighted by a splendid triple Lutz in the short and six more precisely landed triples in the long, four of them different—Lutz, Salchow, cherry and flip— with additional Salchow and cherry for good measure. His spins were not quite in the same class and just slight improvement in this area could make him potentially unbeatable.

Pockar, Frenchman Jean-Christophe Simond and Chicago's David Santee in that order remained in close enough touch after the short free, each still with an apparent victory chance. The Canadian, skating on his home rink with the national support and pressure which that entails, looked the season's most improved male soloist.

Indeed, Brian's performance suggested he could be Scotty's main rival at Hartford, but the Calgary boy this time could not match Scotty's brilliance. He included two triple toe loops and a triple Salchow, but over-rotated a triple loop.

The winner and runner-up share a healthy mutual respect, as do both for

the third-placed Santee—an always stylish skater who on this occasion could not match his two main opponents. Brian Boitano, in only his second senior season, did well to finish fifth behind Simond.

Elaine Zayak owed her women's victory largely to powerful free skating. The 1979 junior world champion from the New York SC featured two triple Salchows and three triple toe loops in a zestful four minutes with scarcely a pause to draw new breath.

Elaine, fifteen, appeared a better short-term bet for international honors than the Canadian runner-up, the still tiny Tracey Wainman, who ended very strongly after falling from a triple Salchow. Only thirteen, Tracey seems destined to rule in years to come.

Claudia Kristofics-Binder, who had set the early pace so well with three immaculate figures, understandably failed to sustain sufficient stamina after only nine days' practice since a bout of rheumatic fever. The tall Viennese tired quickly after falling from a double Axel, but did well enough to finish third.

Sandy Lenz of Rockford SC, fourth, also fell from a double Axel and said she "died in the last thirty seconds"—affected possibly by the altitude and dry atmosphere. Fifth-placed Rosalynn Sumners, the junior world title holder from the Seattle SC, moved impressively into the big league with a highly promising allround performance which underlined the continuing American depth in strength of women's skating.

The well merited ice dance triumph of the Broadmoor's Mike Seibert and Judy Blumberg climaxed an absorbing duel with the British runners-up, Nicky Slater and Karen Barber, remembered best for the two couples' contrasting styles.

Mike and Judy relied much on a basically English mode of technique, though more open, whereas the Brits looked more futuristic, reflecting a modern trend steadily gaining favor among the judges.

How either of these elegant twosomes would compare with the top Russians remained difficult to assess because the Canadian Figure Skating Association did

not invite any Soviet skater to Calgary—a gesture supporting the host nation's athletes who boycotted the Moscow Olympics.

The third dance spot achieved by Bob McCall and Marie McNeil—and the high positions gained by their three compatriot couples—stressed a notable recent rise in the general Canadian level in this branch of the sport.

Scott Gregory and Elisa Spitz, fourth, were interestingly innovative and appeared capable of pressing hard in the US nationals. The majority of couples, in both this and the earlier St. Ivel event, suggested that the cha-cha-cha is one of the most difficult OSP rhythms to interpret.

The next Skate Canada will be held in Ottawa on October 29-31, 1981.
